Useful information to consider when completing a Request for Advice

seating solutions

A Request for Equipment and Modifications Service (EMS) Advice is submitted when a higher specification configurable second manual wheelchair (MWC), second mobility base and/or seating solution is being sought. This is required in relation to the clarification of Whaikaha | Ministry of Disabled People eligibility and access criteria and where the EMS assessor is uncertain as to whether the person meets Whaikaha access criteria

Consideration for the provision of two mobility bases or a higher specification/configurable standard backup MWC

(A standard backup MWC is generally a basic wheelchair with no or minimal adjustment within the frame i.e., not a replication of the primary wheelchair)

'Generally, only **one option** to enable a person to sit safely and comfortably is provided. Consideration may be given for a dedicated seating option to enable a person to eat and drink safely if these activities are not possible within their everyday seating' (Whaikaha Manual, 2014, 11.5.10).

'A standard manual backup wheelchair can be considered for use by a person who has received a power wheelchair or when the power wheelchair is not available' (Whaikaha Manual, 2014, 11.5.3).

- A standard backup MWC is provided and can be used when the power wheelchair (PWC) has broken down and/or is with the technician for repairs and maintenance, it is not expected that a person will be independently mobile in this MWC
- It is anticipated that the standard backup MWC is used infrequently and will meet the mobility and postural support needs of the person for a short duration of time
- Provision of a standard backup MWC is subject to Whaikaha access criteria having been met

Guideline for second mobility/seating, updated April 2023

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Before consulting a Clinical Services Advisor, please consider:

- If a scripted MWC or a PWC is intended to be a person's primary means of mobility and meets Whaikaha eligibility and access criteria
- When recommending a wheelchair for a person, factors like transport and access in and around the home need to be discussed and a plan implemented (if needed) before the wheelchair is issued
- It is noted that this solution may not meet a person's entire mobility needs, e.g., the solution provided may not meet their recreational mobility needs
- For PWC users, a plan needs to be discussed for when the PWC is unavailable (e.g., is being serviced or repaired by the technician), particularly if the user is unable to self-propel their standard backup MWC and/or is home alone for a significant period of time
- If a Whaikaha funded PWC is being used at school only, a standard backup MWC can be provided for at use home and in the community
- For people learning to independently drive a PWC, consideration needs to be given to whether the PWC is suitable as a primary chair. Whaikaha funding is to provide a person with functional independent mobility; it is not intended to provide 'training chairs' for therapy purposes or for people where independent driving is a long-term goal
- When a person has mobility needs that do not meet Whaikaha eligibility and access criteria, alternative sources of funding will need to be considered.

It should be noted that - where a person has had both a scripted MWC and PWC in the past due to exceptional circumstances and a wheelchair replacement is considered, Whaikaha eligibility and access criteria (specifically the second seating criteria) will need to be met. This type of request is not an automatic replacement

Consideration of the provision of a second seating system for use on the standard backup MWC

Before consulting a Clinical Services Advisor, consider:

- It is accepted that when able, the person or caregiver/support person will transfer the seating from the primary PWC to the standard backup MWC.
- Consider how the seating is to be transferred between wheelchairs (e.g., provision of additional mounting hardware or back supports, additional Velcro)
- Consider the frequency that the standard backup MWC is used and/or the length of time the person needs to sit in the wheelchair to ensure a cost-effective solution is sourced e.g., would adjustable back upholstery meet the person's needs, versus a solid back support for this length of time?

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Consideration of static positioning chair and/or indoor seating systems (e.g., fall-out style chairs, lift-out chairs)

- An indoor chair may be considered a person's 'primary' chair for positioning and they receive a standard backup MWC to allow mobility within the home and/or access to where a vehicle can reasonably be parked
- Where a person is unable to be left unsupervised in bed due to their disability-related need, or length of time in bed is not practical/reasonable
- People who have limited sitting tolerance, e.g., high tone. Where multiple configurations and/or power functions have been tried with the primary seating system and extenuating social circumstances exist
- Where a wheelchair solution is unable to be used inside the home, but a safe seating solution is required for feeding

Before consulting a Clinical Services Advisor, consider:

- Has the primary wheelchair been reviewed? Can the issues be managed with a change of seating, configuration and/or additional accessories or power features?
- Is there furniture already available in the home that may meet the need? (e.g., standard lazy boy style chair), this may be complemented with the use of a cushion (e.g., Roho transferred from MWC for pressure relief) or by use of lying/positioning supports
- Can the person spend some time on their bed as an alternative position?
- If a person is needing to spend a significant amount of time in bed for the management of a pressure injury, can the bed be moved to allow for the person to be part of daily life (e.g., in the main living area)

Consideration of high-low bases/ feeding chairs where a wheelchair is in place

'Generally, only one option to enable a person to sit safely and comfortably is provided. Consideration may be given for a dedicated seating option to enable a person to eat and drink safely if these activities **are not possible within their everyday seating.'** (Whaikaha Manual, 2014, 11.5.10).

- Some buggies have the option of an indoor high/low base
- Once the child reaches school age and/or a MWC is provided there is an expectation that the MWC would be used for indoor mobility and this would provide positioning for feeding

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Before consulting a Clinical Services Advisor, consider:

- Configuration of the wheelchair to ensure optimal positioning for feeding
- Transport to/from and access into the home to ensure the wheelchair can be used inside
- Transfers between the two seating systems and how this will be managed
- The time spent in the second seating solution and the impact this will have on positioning needs

Requests for advice are all reviewed on an individual, case-by-case basis.

Genuine and exceptional circumstances may be considered for a higher specification MWC, second mobility base and/or seating.

Cost-effective equipment should be considered in the first instances before proposing higher specification MWC, second mobility base and/or seating. This includes refurbished equipment or a band 1 or 2 MWC, seating or other equipment solutions. This might result in a solution similar to the mobility base or seating that was requested.
